Rector's Reflections

Dear Friends,

On the Eve of Palm Sunday there was an unusual kind of procession – over 800 processions to be exact – all over the United States and in numerous countries around the world. Those with military might or vast political capital did not lead these processions. In fact, most of the organizers of these processions are not even old enough to vote.

These processions or marches, were organized out of the tragedy of the school shooting that occurred on Valentine's Day in Parkland, Florida and were set in motion by young people who do not remember a time when frequent mass shootings were not the norm in our country. These young people were born after Columbine and know things no one should know; like that it takes at least 10 shooting victims in one incident to get on the radar of the national media.

With an awareness beyond their years, and a raw humility, these young people recognize the intersectionality of the issue of gun violence and carried signs saying, "dear brothers and sisters that live with gun violence, we are sorry that we're just now joining your fight."

Soon after the Parkland shooting a group of Chicago high school students travelled to Florida to meet with a group of Marjory Stoneman Douglas students. This gathering of two groups of young people from different backgrounds who have a common interest of addressing gun violence helped clarify the difference between how violence has affected those in Parkland versus everyday violence in Chicago. A spirit of collaboration and strength in shared learning characterized the meeting.

On Palm Sunday Eve a group from St. Andrew's joined several hundred Episcopalians from 20 parishes around our Diocese who joined several thousand people of all ages in a vocal and peaceful march calling for common sense gun control. This is a movement led by young people who have had enough of senseless violence made possible in a culture which as they said, "cares more about broad access to all kinds of guns than the lives of its children."

Many in the march carried signs with messages, wise, insightful, clever and some profane. The most haunting one for me was on the back of a preschooler, carried on her mother's back, tired from the long march, that read, "My preschool does lockdown drills."

Later, in a follow up news segment I saw a mother whose child was killed at Sandy Hook, reach out in support and kindness to a young man whose close friend was killed in Parkland saying, "You give me hope that we are closer to making lasting change."

In a letter written on Feb. 14, Bishop Mark Hollingsworth said, "this not politicizing a tragedy but is joining the Savior of the world on his journey to Jerusalem, joining his sacrifice by sacrificing whatever we must for the sake and safety of God's beloved."

The Easter Season is a season of hope as we engage the Resurrected Christ. I echo the words of the mother from Sandy Hook. The courage and passion of the young people in this movement gives me hope. They encourage me to march on Saturday, pray on Sunday and write and call legislators on Monday.

Where are you finding hope that leads to action this Easter Season? I would love to hear from you.

The Episcopal Church's Long Term Commitment to Racial Healing, Reconciliation, and Justice

The Context

Rooted in The Jesus Movement: The ongoing community of people centered on following Jesus into loving, liberating, life-giving relationship with God (evangelism), with each other (reconciliation), and with creation (environmental stewardship).

Called forth by General Convention Resolution C019 (Establish Response to Systemic Injustice).

Crafted by the leaders of the House of Bishops and House of Deputies – Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, House of Deputies President Gay Clark Jennings, House of Bishops Vice President Mary Gray Reeves and (now former Vice President) Dean Wolfe, and House of Deputies Vice President Byron Rushing and Secretary Michael Barlowe – with staff and many partners.

Frames a multi-year journey as part of a long-term, multi-generation commitment.

Moves beyond the United States and beyond black and white, to consider racism in many nations, among many races, ethnicities and cultures.

Deploys \$2 million allocated by General Convention, along with other resources.





Columbarium Update

St. Andrew's Columbarium Ministry began in 2016 with the installation of a 32 Niche Columbarium in the back of the nave. This ministry offers a place for the earthly remains of loved ones to be placed in a sacred and secure area of the church. Its proximity to the font and prayer candles signify the connection between the mourning of loss and the joy of the Resurrection.

Thirteen of the Thirty-two niches in St. Andrew's Columbarium have been reserved. The cost of one niche including urn and plate engraving is \$1000. Each niche can hold two urns at the cost of \$200 for the second urn. This ministry is available to anyone who has a relationship with St. Andrew's.
