Rector's Reflections

Dear Church,

Lent is soon upon us with Ash Wednesday occurring on Feb. 17, 2021. In the season of Lent, we're reminded that, again and again, suffering and brokenness find us. We doubt again, we lament again, we mess up again. Again and again, the story of Jesus on the cross repeats—every time lives are taken unjustly, every time the powerful choose corruption and violence, every time individuals forget how to love. This past year has not brought anything new but has exacerbated... brought into focus, that which has been with us for a long time. We are seeing more clearly, that which has come around, again and again.

With exasperation we exclaim, "Again?! How long, O God?" And yet, in the midst of the motion blur chaos of our lives, God offers a sacred refrain: "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." Again and again, God breaks the cycle and offers us a new way forward. In this season, we need rituals—both old and new—to remember and be transformed. Embodied practice builds muscle memory. Repetition helps retrain our neural pathways. * We begin this Lenten season in the manner that interrupted last year's Lent. We gather – not in our church building, but online, on Zoom, via phone calls. If we happen to meet in person, we are distanced by the 6 feet required for safety and the masks we wear. Ordinary occurrences before -- going out to dinner with groups of friends, going to the movies or concerts, dashing out to the store without a second thought – we now approach with caution and weigh the risks.

This Lenten season, we have been almost a year, masked, socially distanced, aware of the continued threat of the virus. Racial and economic inequity has been magnified, racial and economic injustice, brought front and center in these days. That which we thought could never happen in our nation's capital, did happen, as we watched in disbelief, the events of Jan. 6, in Washington, DC.

There is more uncertainty and hesitation. And... again, it is the season of Lent.

A “Lent at Home” Packet containing a devotional guide and some tools for the journey thorough Lent is being mailed to your home. There will be opportunities for focused study and fellowship in Zoom small groups. Midweek worship opportunities will be provided. We will attempt some unconventional ways to keep familiar rituals, with a How to Make Ashes for Ash Wednesday at Home Tutorial on Zoom, a Virtual Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on Zoom and Ash Wednesday services accessible via several platforms. We will stretch our reach into the community with Facebook Live Noonday Prayer and messages in print and social media. There will be opportunities to give and serve as well as to be still and reflect.

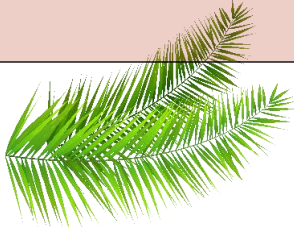
When your Lenten devotional guide arrives in your home, I encourage you to walk through the weekly readings and prompts at your own pace throughout the season, following the rhythm that works best for you. May the art, reflections, and poetry strengthen and stretch you, shaping you into a more faithful disciple. This Lent, may God’s steadfast love cradle our laments. May God’s grace wash over our weariness. And may we bring all of who we are to God—trusting that God will meet us, time and again, along the way. *

As we did during Advent, Christmas and Epiphany, we will rely upon The Sanctified Art Creative Team, Lisle Gwynn Garrity, Sarah Are, Hannah Garrity, and Lauren Wright Pittman, for many of the resources we will use to build the Lenten experience with St. Andrew’s. I am grateful for the depth of reflection, the creativity and generosity with which they share their gifts. Let us notice, with intention, that which comes around, “Again and Again” as we enter into Lent 2021.

How to Make Ashes for Ash Wednesday

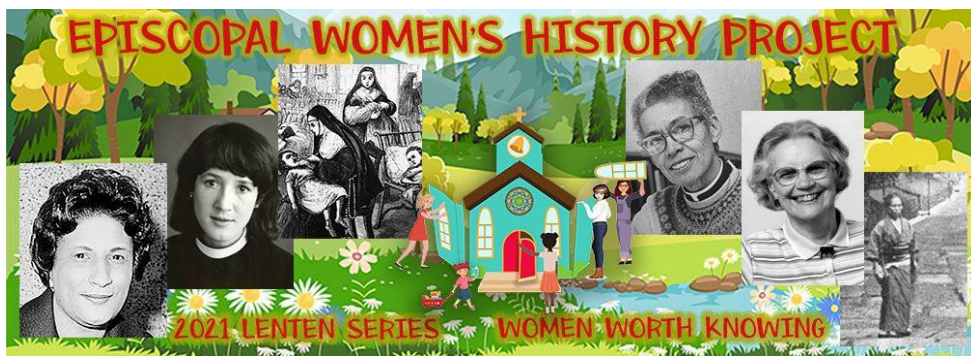

Union of Black Episcopalians Episcopal Women's History Project 2021 Lenten Series "Women Worth Knowing" February 18 – March 25

There are hundreds of remarkable stories of women who have served the Episcopal Church with love, with persistence, with energy and with creativity. EWHP is presenting a series telling the stories of six women who have made an impact on the Episcopal Church. There will be time for discussion and questions. **The Rev. Dr. Jo Ann Barker**, President of EWHP will be emcee. The Rev. Yein Esther Kim is the administrator for the series. The sessions will be presented as a Zoom experience where there is room for all who wish to participate. The sessions will also be recorded and can be accessed on the EWHP YouTube Channel. The series will begin on Thursday February 18, 2021, and continued on February 25, and March 4, 11, 18 and 25. Registration is required, [Click here](#). Here are the topics that will be presented:

February 18, Presenter: Dr. Joan Gundersen, Title: Constance Baker Motley: Doing Justice. Meet the Episcopalian who became the face of NAACP in courtrooms across the South during the Civil Rights movement.

February 25, Presenter: Pan Adams McCaslin, Title: The Rev. Peggy Bosmeyer Campbell. The first woman ordained in Arkansas; priest, an organizer, a teacher.

March 4, Presenter: Sister Hannah Aloysius, Title: Sister Constance and her Companions. Known as the "Martyrs of Memphis," as they cared for the sick and dying during the yellow fever epidemic of 1878.

March 11, Presenter: Dr. Marty Wheeler Burnett, Title: Hope, Joy, and Wonder. The Hymns of Rae E. Whitney, a celebration of the life and work of the Nebraska hymn poet, the prolific author of over 500 hymns.

March 18, Presenters: The Rt. Rev. Kim Jackson and The Rev. Nan Peete. Title: The Rev. Pauli Murray, an American civil rights activist who became a lawyer, a women's rights activist, Episcopal priest, and author.

March 25, Presenter: Dr. Robin Woods Sumners, Title: The Remarkable Life of Gertrude Sumners, Missionary Teacher in Kyoto, Japan 1931-1967, worker in World War II, and life-long Episcopalian.

Absalom Jones Service

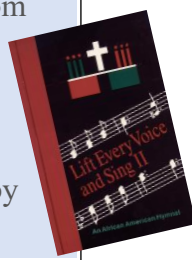

In preparing for this Lent, I am feeling a genuine mix of emotions. I am excited for all of the things that we have prepared. I am sad that we will not be able to share in one of my favorite services (Ash Wednesday) in person and remind each other of our earthiness and creatureliness. I am angry that we are still in this pandemic. I am grateful that I am here with you all and get to see the signs of your faithfulness and care. It's a complicated time, and that is okay. What traditions are you adapting? How are you thinking about "giving up" or "taking on" things differently this year? I am looking forward to our pancake supper on zoom together (I'm going to try a new recipe with cinnamon swirl pancakes!), and I hope to check in with many of you then. If not, I always love to hear from you all and would love to have check ins over zoom during the Lenten season.

- For children: there will be materials sent out for some age-appropriate reflections and activities at home.
- For middle school youth: we will be hosting occasional game nights on zoom with time for check ins and reflection. We have a copy of JackBox to do game nights over zoom that are age appropriate and will be hosted by the middle school youth for other families. Sign ups will be sent out for each one so check your inboxes throughout Lent for a time to play and rest together.
- For high school youth: we will have weekly small group together on Thursday at 7pm on zoom. We will be reflecting on Sabbath – what does it mean to dwell in God's grace? to rest? how does this relate to the work of justice to which God calls us?
- For the 20s and 30s group, we have not settled on a book or topic, but we will be meeting on Tuesday nights at 8pm on zoom.
- Finally, I will be offering a small group on Monday nights at 7pm where we will meditate on poetry and faith, engaging poetry from all sorts of backgrounds and forms. If you are interested in this group, contact me at gregory.d.stark@gmail.com.

As always, know that you all are in my prayers and that I am so grateful for your prayers and ministry in this place. May God draw us all deeper in fellowship with God and with the company of the faithful during this season.

Reconciliation of a Penitent – A Shrove Tuesday Ritual
Offered by Zoom or phone call
on Sunday, February 14, and Tuesday, February 16, by appointment

Do Episcopalians practice confession? Yes, we do! In addition to confession in daily prayers and the Holy Eucharist, the Episcopal Church has a sacramental ritual, traditionally offered on Shrove Tuesday, but also upon request, called “Reconciliation of a Penitent.” In this rite a person who repents may confess their sins to God in the presence of a priest and receive the assurance of pardon and the grace of absolution (BCP, p. 861). It is also called penance and confession.

The church’s ministry of reconciliation is from God, “who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation” (2 Cor 5:18). The ministry of reconciliation has been committed by Christ to the church. It is exercised through the care each Christian has for others, through the common prayer of Christians assembled for public worship, and through the priesthood of the church and its ministers declaring absolution (BCP, p. 446). The Reconciliation of a Penitent is not limited to times of sickness. Confessions may be heard at any time and any place. After the penitent has confessed all serious sins troubling the conscience and given evidence of contrition, the priest offers counsel and encouragement before pronouncing absolution. Before pronouncing absolution, the priest may assign a psalm, prayer, or hymn to be said, or something to be done, as a sign or penitence and act of thanksgiving. The secrecy of the confession is morally absolute for the confessor and must not be broken (BCP, p. 446). If you would like to know more or make an appointment for this ritual, contact The Rev.
